Weinberg, a long-time South African resident, has selected photographs which have survived from a much larger collection of negatives which he built up while working as a staff photographer for *New Age*. *New Age* was an independent, progressive weekly which supported the ANC, and which was closed down in 1962 as part of the crackdown on ANC in the wake of Sharpeville. The photographs cover a period from the mid-1940s to the early 1960s. While the author makes no claim to comprehensive historical or chronological completeness, it is his hope that the character of both the struggle and the people involved in it will emerge. The collection particularly calls attention to the manifestly urban nature of much of ANC's constituency, which stands in poignant contradiction to the rural resettlement programs of today's apartheid system.

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
