Gerald Allen's architectural firm in New York is involved in a number of private and institutional building projects in the eastern United States. He is the author of a number of books and articles on architecture, a Professor of Architecture at Carnegie-Mellon University, and a member of the executive board of the Architectural League.

Garrett Eckbo has had a distinguished career as teacher, writer and landscape architect. He taught at the University of Southern California and the University of California, Berkeley, where he was Department Chairman from 1965 to 1969. He has published numerous articles and books, among them *Environment and Design* and *The Landscape We See*. In continuous practice for over thirty years, Mr. Eckbo is currently a private consultant living in Berkeley.

Frances Halsband is a partner in the firm of a R. M. Kliment & Frances Halsband Architects, and she is President of the Architectural League of New York.

Randolph Hester, Jr. is Chairman of the Department of Landscape Architecture at the University of California, Berkeley, and a principal of the firm, Community Development Planning and Design. A noted community designer, Hester's portrait of Westport, California, is the first public exhibit of his art since 1968.

Catherine Howett writes about the history of the American landscape and the discipline of landscape architecture, past and present. She is on the faculty of the School of Environmental Design at the University of Georgia.

Dean W. O'Brien teaches communication and the arts at the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, where he has been investigating possible links between physically habitable landscapes and mentally habitable mass-media environments. He is currently working on a book about the construction of public images.

Reuben M. Rainey teaches history and theory of landscape architecture at the University of Virginia. Prior to his professional training as a landscape architect, he taught history and philosophy of religion at Columbia University and Middlebury College.

Kyle Thayer will receive his M. Arch. degree from the University of California, Berkeley in May 1988.
