Mel has lots of experience with the 54 National organization serving two terms as a Director at Large. She has chaired two ANAC 55 committees – Palliative Care and Global. Locally, Mel has been a member of the Greater New 56 York ANAC chapter, has maintained her ACRN since 1997, and served in the local chapter 57 leadership. She brings her passion, and the lessons learned from nurses doing the work of HIV 58 throughout the world to the organization and our members. 59 60 *Mitchell Wharton* recently served on the ANAC BOD as our Treasurer and is now our 61 President-Elect. He is committed to keeping ANAC at the forefront of educating and 62 empowering health professionals in the field of HIV. As a nurse researcher, she addresses sexual health interventions for young Black women.
