## The Expedition of Capt. J.W. Davidson from Fort Tejon to the Owens Valley in 1859

Edited by Philip J. Wilke and Harry W. Lawton



The expedition of Capt. J.W. Davidson in the summer of 1859 resulted in the earliest detailed account of the Owens Valley, east-central California, and its Paiute inhabitants. Davidson commanded a punitive expedition of U.S. Cavalry from Ft. Tejon to the Owens Valley to recover livestock stolen from ranches in the southern counties of California and rumored to have been driven to this valley east of the Sierras. Upon reaching the valley, Davidson found no livestock of any kind. Instead he found the unjustly accused Paiutes engaged in collecting and storing food supplies for winter. They were also operating a remarkably extensive agricultural system that involved irrigation of wild plant species on vast tracts of land. In accordance with his instructions, Davidson filled out his report with what are apparently the earliest detailed ethnographic observations on the Owens Valley Paiute.

This volume contains an introductory essay, photographs of scenes along the route of the march, and extensive explanatory notes. It is both the story of the expedition and an account of the observations of its commander. Those interested in western military history, California history, and California and Great Basin ethnography will find this volume an important contribution.
