The authors of the article “The Effect of Keystone Individuals on Collective Outcomes Can Be Mediated through Interactions or Behavioral Persistence,” published in the August 2016 issue of *The American Naturalist* (pp. 240–252), were recently made aware of anomalies in the data collected by J. N. Pruitt on the persistence of boldness of individual spiders over a 90-day period. The anomalies include values that are repeated more frequently than expected according to an unbiased sample and duplication of segments of the data. Such anomalies were not detected in the data collected by C. N. Keiser on the persistence of boldness over 24 days. The model detailed in this article was *not* parameterized according to these data. Instead, the data were presented to provide biological context in the appendix. No corrections to the main text are required; however, we provide here a corrected figure A1 for the appendix, which excludes the 90-day data. In addition, there are 25 days for three individuals rather than 24 days, as stated in the appendix. Thus, there were 3–25 (average, 12.14) measurements per spider and a total of 255 measurements. R code analyzing and plotting the empirical data is now posted in the Dryad Digital Repository (<https://doi.org/10.5061/dryad.5mm01>).

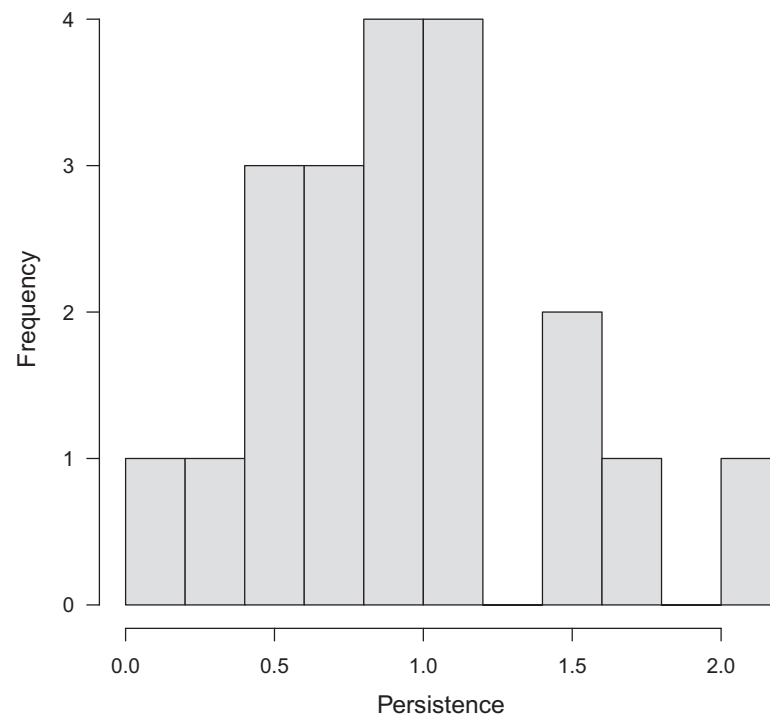


Figure A1: Distribution of empirical persistence values.
