

- There is a growing focus on access and affordability across higher education right now
- This need was exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic
- Our goal is to share with you two approaches, one beginning and one mature, for developing programs that support OER creation and adoption

Grassroots Efforts Set the Foundation at UC San Diego

- Cross-campus interest group formed
- Student groups
 - UCSD CALPIRG
 - Students for Open Access
- Faculty requests for publishing support



Collective Impact at UC San Diego

- The Executive Vice Chancellor has a vision for high-level projects bringing together many units across campus leveraging a variety of expertise
- We work as part of the Affordable and Open Course Materials Steering Committee, co-chaired by the University Librarian and Director of the Teaching + Learning Commons
- Our group is the Open Educational Resources Task Force, including members from the Library and the Teaching + Learning Commons



UC San Diego Student Survey (Fall 2021)

- Units of campus involved: Student Affairs, the Library, the Provosts, Associated Students, Students for Open Access, and CALPIRG
- Open for two weeks in mid-November 2021
- Population level survey, distributed to 32,827 UC San Diego undergraduate students
- 6.5% response rate; demographics were almost all within 1% of campus levels

Student Survey Response Themes

- 1. Different demographic groups of students experience **disparate impacts** with regards to access to course materials
- 2. **Homework codes** are a significant cost barrier to students
- 3. Students feel frustration in being asked to purchase materials that are then rarely used
- 4. Students **appreciate ownership and reuse** of materials
- 5. Material **costs outside of the major** (e.g., in the writing programs) are seen as an extra burden

UC San Diego Faculty Focus Groups (Winter 2022)

- 4 focus groups held, ranging from experienced OER users and creators to interested learners
- Participants recruited via established campus cohorts (such as a faculty teaching and research community, the business school, etc.)
- Held over Zoom for approximately 1 hour and notes transcribed for qualitative analysis

Faculty Focus Groups Response Themes

- 1. A **variety of approaches** to picking materials, material needs, and format types across departments
- 2. **Lack of time** to create materials each quarter and grade/give feedback to large classes
- 3. Concern about credit (locally) and people stealing intellectual property on the web
- 4. Lack of clarity around **what can be used** (OER content, copyright, and licensing)
- 5. Desire for UC-wide or local community college collaboration
- 6. **Incentives** to create or locate quality OE materials (financial, collaborative, credit in P&T, course release, etc), including non-tenure track faculty

Next Steps, UC San Diego

- The Affordable and Open Course Materials campus steering committee will meet in March and receive the Open Educational Resources Task Force report of work to date
- At that point, the task force plans to propose a pilot program compatible with the collective impact framework that the campus steering committee is working within

 In Summer 2022, we expect that the steering committee will finalize its recommendations and launch pilot OER/ACM projects. Connections to the University of California system and the statewide projects are also anticipated

OER Program Goals

- Reduce educational costs for students.
- Encourage and support the adoption, adaptation, or creation of OER and other free and low-cost materials as a textbook alternative.
- Provide technical support for instructors to implement OER in courses.
- Empower instructors to engage in new pedagogical models that leverage the affordances of OER and open education.







Open Educational Resources and Affordable Textbook Fund

Textbook costs significantly increase the financial burden on college students. No student should feel the need to drop out of classes because they can't afford the required materials. Through the Open Educational Resource and Affordable Textbook Program, the MSU Libraries offer students enrolled in many courses with costly textbooks a way to read those books without buying them. Since its beginning in the Fall 2019 semester, the Libraries' OER program has saved students an estimated \$4 million and impacted over 30,000 students.

Give to MSU Libraries and help provide MSU students with access to the textbooks they need to excel in every semester.

The Open Educational Resource and Affordable Textbook Program was created to provide textbooks and other educational materials to reduce student costs. These resources include textbooks, videos, course modules, homework assignments, digital resources and more. The average cost of materials per course is \$70, and we don't want undergraduates to have to choose between passing a course and getting enough food to eat. Your support of this program will help students succeed.

A BILL TO: Advocate the use and expansion of Open Educational Resources (OER) in MSU undergraduate courses

THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF MICHIGAN STATE UNIVERSITY ENACT:

WHEREAS, Students, whether in or out-of-state, who attended a public four-year university will spend on average, \$1,240 on books and supplies¹, and;

WHEREAS, Michigan State University provides an example budget for an in-state/out-of-state freshman that estimates \$1,154 budget for books and supplies², and;

WHEREAS, the average price of college textbooks has increased four times faster than rate of inflation in the past decade³, and;

WHEREAS, the use of access codes by college students to utilize online platforms have increased 60% from 2016-17 with the average cost of buying an access code being \$100⁴, and;

WHEREAS, the use of Inclusive Access programs by commercial publishers eliminates students' choice and locks them into a platform that ensures as many students as possible are
