A LETTER FROM THE EDITORS

In this tumultuous time, we would like to acknowledge the international crisis that is the COVID-19 pandemic. All of the papers included in this edition were submitted between June 2019 and December 2020, and therefore make no comment on the global upheaval in which we now find ourselves. We want to thank our healthcare workers, scientists, and public health officials all over the world for the work they are doing to alleviate suffering. We want them to know that their tireless efforts are appreciated.

As an expression of solidarity, we would like to affirm our unwavering support for the COLA movement and the needs of graduate students at our own campus and across the country. Our students work multiple jobs, experience precarious housing, homelessness, and suffer from food insecurity. This situation is untenable. We condemn, in the strongest of words, our university's continued efforts to punish students amidst a global pandemic. At UC Santa Cruz, some of our most vulnerable students—students of color, undocumented students and students from working-class backgrounds—are among those who have been most aggressively targeted by the university's disciplinary apparatus. It is unfathomable that our university, despite its long history of student activism, continues to hold disciplinary hearings—showcasing a blatant disregard for the physical and emotional harm already afflicted on our graduate students. In spite of the callous disregard detailed above, it is our hope that the University of California, Santa Cruz—and the UC system as a whole—emerges from the current crisis with a renewed sense of its mission as a public institution dedicated to social justice.

We would also like to collectively recognize the violence caused by centuries of systematic racism towards black Americans. As a journal we do not condone discrimination of any kind and would like to reaffirm our support of the Black Lives Matter movement and our campus BIPOC community. Our journal was built with the intention of publishing marginalized voices and creating a safe space for UCSC students of all backgrounds. To that end, we want to state clearly that we condemn white supremacy and racial inequality and we urge all leaders around the globe to accelerate their efforts in dismantling systems of oppression and

violence. Furthermore, we stand in solidarity with the demands for police reform and calls for our administration to break their relationship with city police and other agencies that have a demonstrated history of racial discrimination and violence.

We encourage our readers to seek to educate themselves on black struggles, believe black narratives, and donate to organizations fighting for justice.
