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Inpatient Telehealth for Family Engagement: A Qualitative Process Evaluation

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Background


- COVID-19 has impeded the delivery of family-centered care
- Telehealth (TH) permits family members to virtually transmit into the hospital as a means to enhance family engagement

Objectives

Explore the factors affecting the implementation and impact of the inpatient telehealth intervention for family engagement

Methods

- Qualitative study using inductive thematic analysis with grounded theory procedures
- Semi-structured interviews with UCDHS clinicians, patients, & family who used TH for family engagement
- Data analyzed concurrently with data collection
- Identify linkages & patterns between codes until data saturation



Quotes

"We had to tell them that, 'if you're going to abuse [telehealth] then we're not going to be able to put it

"If we catch it in the very beginning, let them know the expectations of it... I feel like the rest of the course of the stay of the [patient] goes pretty smoothly"

"I leave 'call' up to interpretation for what the family would like it to

"I think a lot of family members don't realize that we have the capability to do... telehealth"

"Family members [from] different parts of the world... can be in [telehealth] all at the same time."

"You have both the patient and the caregiver interacting as we would normally when they come to the bedside."

Results

11 interviews were conducted. Three major themes are emerging (left)
