

Exploring Gender Justice, Religion, and Ethics



During my tenure as a Research Scholar with CSW, I have been working on the first draft of a book manuscript tentatively titled, “Humanizing the Sacred: Gender Justice, Islamic Reformation and Ethical Selves.” Additionally, I recently completed an article on the art of feminist storytelling in Cairo, which explores the feminist strategy of reinterpreting and performing folktales by members of a Cairene women’s organization. In the article, which is currently under review, I argue that this particular form of cultural knowledge production is a distinct practice of dissent to re-imagine

subjectivity, cultural heritage, and national belonging. I am also working on a short essay for publication about Islamic masculinities and men’s responsibilities within contemporary projects of gender justice and social transformation in communities of Muslims.

Azza Basarudin has been a CSW Research Scholar since 2010. She received her Ph.D. in Women’s Studies at the UCLA in 2009. Her work explores feminist and religious knowledge production through hermeneutic projects and memory work in Southeast Asia and the Middle East. She was recently offered a prestigious appointment as a Research Associate in the Women’s Studies in Religion Program at Harvard Divinity School.
