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Robin Liggett is a Professor of Urban Planning and Architecture at UCLA. While her research focuses primarily on computer graphic aids to design and decision making, she has collaborated on a number of studies related to transit crime and the built environment.

Anastasia Loukaitou-Sideris is a Professor of Urban Planning at UCLA. She is the author of numerous articles and the co-author of the book *Urban Design Downtown: Poetics and Politics of Form* (University of California Press, 1998).

Thomas J. Kane is Department Vice Chair and Professor of Policy Studies and Economics at the UCLA School of Public Policy and Social Research. He also directs the Center on Education Policy and Evaluation. His research focuses on education and human capital, design of school accountability systems, college financial aid policy, race-conscious college admissions, labor economics, applied econometrics, and teen fertility.

Shannon McConville is a research analyst at the Stanford Department of Health Research and Policy. Previously, she was a project manager and research associate for the UCLA Ralph and Goldy Lewis Center where she worked on projects related to welfare reform, employer-sponsored health insurance, and urban poverty. She is the author of "Access to Employment-Sponsored Health Insurance Among Welfare Recipients," a report funded by the California HealthCare Foundation, and "Low-Income Neighborhoods in Southern California: Evolution and Trajectory," a Brookings Institution report. Her current work focuses on racial and ethnic health disparities in neonatal outcomes.

Daniel J.B. Mitchell is Ho-su Wu Professor at the UCLA Anderson School and the School of Public Policy and Social Research. His interests focus on labor economics, labor relations, and related areas. Mitchell's most recent book is *Pensions, Politics, and the Elderly* (M.E. Sharpe, 2000).

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Douglas O. Staiger is Associate Professor of Economics at Dartmouth College. His fields of specialization include health economics, labor economics, the economics of education, and applied economics. He is a Research Associate of the National Bureau of Economic research, and formerly taught at Stanford, Harvard, and Princeton Universities.

Michael A. Stoll is an Associate Professor of Policy Studies in the School of Public Policy and Social Research, and Interim Director of the Center for the Study of Urban Poverty, at the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA). He is the author of numerous publications on the subjects of race, poverty and labor markets, especially as these pertain to current issues in welfare reform, transportation, and mass incarceration in the U.S.

Wellford "Buzz" Wilms is Professor of Education and Policy Studies in the UCLA Graduate School of Education and Information Sciences. His Research interests are in the demise of mass production and the transformation of organizations and their cultures and the diffusion of ideas from one sector to another. Current research aims at understanding how service organizations (higher education, teacher unions, and police agencies in particular) adjust to rapid changes in the environment, and the implications for education and policy.
