CONTRIBUTORS

ADRIANA BERGERO, an editor of *Mester*, is finishing her course work in the doctoral program of UCLA's department of Spanish and Portuguese where she received that department's outstanding graduate research paper award for 1984-85. She has studied in Argentina and Spain and her areas of specialization are Spanish contemporary literature and Latin American literature. She is currently working on an article for publication about Leopoldo Lugones and a paper for presentation at the Lorca symposium at UCLA in May.

LINDA BRITT is currently completing her doctoral thesis, "Swan Song: Late Trends in the Poetry of Federico García Lorca", at the University of Virginia under the direction of Juan Cano Ballesta. She holds a B.A. from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte and a M.A. from the University of Arkansas.

JUAN CARLOS GALEANO, a graduate of the Universidad Pedagógica Nacional in Bogotá, is presently pursuing a master's degree at the University of Kentucky. He has also published in the Spanish literary magazine, *Turia*, and is currently working on William Carlos Williams translations.

LAWRENCE H. KLIBBE received his doctorate from Syracuse University and now serves as Professor of Spanish at New York University. His work in 19th and 20th century Spanish literature incudes: Lorca's "Impresiones y paisajes": The Young Artist; Fernán Caballero; and José María Pereda. A member of the Fundación Federico García Lorca, he is currently engaged in work on several conference papers on Lorca and a translation into English of Impressions and Landscapes.

ED LAZZARA is a graduate student at U.C.L.A. where he is pursuing a master's degree in Romance Linguistics and Literature. He recently joined the editorial board of *Mester*. His poetry has also appeared in the Portuguese-American newspaper, *Luso-Americano*, as well as in *Reflections*, a journal of Montclair State College where he did his undergraduate work.
