
Introduction

The Florida Youth Tobacco Survey (FYTS) was administered in the spring of 2008 to 38,510 middle school students and 40,283 high school students in 744 public schools throughout the state. The survey response rate for middle schools was 79%, and the survey response rate for high schools was 73%. The FYTS has been conducted annually since 1998. The data presented in this fact sheet are weighted to represent the entire population of public middle and high school students in Florida.


Taught in Class - Reasons Why Peers Smoke Cigarettes

Among Florida public middle school students, the prevalence of being taught about the reasons why some people of their age smoke increased by 44.2% from 1998 to 2002, and then decreased by 14.5% from 2002 to 2008.

Among Florida public high school students, the prevalence of being taught about the reasons why some people of their age smoke increased by 42.2% from 1998 to 2003, and then decreased by 19.9% from 2003 to 2008.



Taught in Class - Most Peers Do Not Smoke Cigarettes



Among middle school students, the prevalence of being taught in class that most of their peers do not smoke cigarettes increased by 66.3%, from 20.8% in 1998 to 34.6% in 2001, but decreased by 15.6% from 2001 to 2008.

Among high school students, the prevalence of receiving this information increased by 64.4%, from 13.5% in 1998 to 22.2% in 2003, but then decreased by 21.6% from 2003 to 2008.



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
Practiced in Class Ways to Say "No" to Tobacco

Among middle school students, the prevalence of practicing ways to say "no" to tobacco in class increased by 47.5%, from 32.4% in 1998 to 47.8% in 2002, and then decreased by 10.7% from 2002 to 2008.

Among high school students, the prevalence of this behavior increased by 52.2%, from 15.7% in 1998 to 23.9% in 2002, and then decreased by 13.4% from 2002 to 2008.


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Any Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE)

A student was considered as receiving any TUPE if he or she responded "yes" to one or more of the five questions related to TUPE.


Among middle school students, the prevalence of receiving any TUPE increased by 16.4%, from 65.8% in 1998 to 76.6% in 2002, and decreased by 5.0% from 2002 to 2008.

Among high school students, the prevalence of receiving any TUPE increased by 17.4%, from 48.4% in 1998, to 56.8% in 2003, and decreased by 11.3% from 2003 to 2008.



Comprehensive Tobacco Use Prevention Education (TUPE)

A student was considered as receiving comprehensive TUPE if he or she responded "yes" to all five questions related to TUPE.



Among middle school students, the prevalence of receiving comprehensive TUPE increased by 138.1%, from 8.4% in 1998 to 20.0% in 2002, and then decreased by 19.5% from 2002 to 2008.

Among high school students, the prevalence of receiving comprehensive TUPE increased by 136.2%, from 4.7% in 1998 to 11.1% in 2002, and then decreased by 22.5% from 2002 to 2008.

* The five questions related to TUPE are the four included in this document and an additional question about tobacco education in general.
