Report from Joseph Cerny

George Rogosa has now retired from DOE, but he is continuing to serve on a part-time basis until a successor is appointed. There will be even further change in the Division of Nuclear Physics office in Germantown, since, in addition to this replacement of Dr. Rogosa, two new staff positions will also be filled.

A major event this summer has been a special Long Range Planning meeting of NUSAC, held at Orleans, Mass., and attended by committee member Bernard Harvey and additionally by David Scott as a consultant. A report from committee chairman Professor Herman Feshbach is due in early September. We plan to hold a Division seminar in late September at which Harvey and Scott will discuss the results of this important meeting.

Dr. Howell Pugh will be leaving his position at NSF and joining our Division as Scientific Director of the Bevalac some time in October.

Asimov Wins New Seaborg Award

The International Platform Association has established a Glenn Seaborg Award, to be presented annually to the person who has created the most public interest in science. The IPA, a professional, non-partisan organization of lecturers, founded in 1831 by Daniel Webster and Josiah Holbrook lists among its current officers Lowell Thomas, Glenn Seaborg, Eileen Hall, Dan Tyler Moore, Victor Borge, Art Linkletter, and Edna Sinclair. The first recipient of the award is Isaac Asimov for "an unparalleled record in stimulating broad scientific interest and inquiry" in his writing and lecturing.
